CULTURE

Australian Culture is as broad and varied as the country's landscape. Australia is multicultural and multiracial, and this is reflected in the country's food, lifestyle and cultural practices and experience.

Australia has an important heritage from its indigenous people, which plays a defining role in the cultural landscape.

This diversity of influences creates a cultural environment in Australia that is lively, energised, innovative and outward looking.

As of 2020, the population of Australia has been estimated to be 25.5 million people, with the most populous states being New South Wales (NSW) and Victoria with regards to their respective capitals Sydney and Melbourne.

Australia's population is usually centred around the coast lines of Australia, from Adelaide to Cairns with a small population on the western side of Australia.





GEOGRAPHY

Australia is an island continent and is also the world's sixth largest country equating to roughly 7,682,300square kilometres.

Australia lies between the Indian and Pacific Oceans and the country is approximately 4,000 kilometres from east to west and 3,200 kilometres from north to south with a coastline that spans over 36,000 kilometres long.

Canberra is Australia's capital city and is situated in the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). The ACT is located roughly between Sydney and Melbourne.

Australia is famous for landmarks such as the Sydney Harbour Bridge, the Sydney Opera House and Bondi Beach. Australia is also home to 19 listed World Heritage Sites.

In Australia you will experience temperate weather for most of the year.

The Northern States are usually warm most of the time with the Southern States experiencing cool winters but rarely sub-zero temperatures.

Snow falls during the winter months on the higher mountains, allowing skiing in Southern NSW and VIC during the winter months.





The first inhabitants of Australia, the Aboriginal people, are believed to have migrated from some unknown point in Asia to Australia between 50,000 and 60,000 years ago.

The first European settlement of Australia was in January 1788, when the First Fleet sailed into Botany Bay under the command of Captain Arthur Phillip.

Freedom of religion in Australia is allowed in practice and protected to varying degrees through the constitution and legislation at the Federal, state and territory level. Australia is a secular country with legislated separation of church and state and with no state religion.

This legislation includes the right to change your religion or beliefs at any time. You also have the right to put your thoughts and beliefs into action. This could include your right to wear religious clothing, the right to talk about your beliefs or take part in religious worship.

If you require a quiet space during the day or evening to practice your religion, please speak to your Student Services Team who will work with you to organise this.

IH Sydney Training Services has campuses located in Sydney, Bondi, Melbourne, Darwin, Gold Coast, Byron Bay and Adelaide. Our Campus opening hours are from 8:00 am until 6:00 pm Monday to Friday – however times may vary depending on the campus.



The Sydney City campus is located in the heart of the Central Business District (CBD), a 5-minute walk from the Queen Victoria Building and 10 minutes from both Town Hall and Wynyard train stations. Bondi Campus

Level 1, 237 Oxford Street, Bondi Junction, NSW

The Bondi campus is located in Bondi Junction, less than a 5-minute walk from the train station. Surrounded by shops, restaurants and cafes, the campus is just a 20-minute bus ride away from the iconic Bondi Beach. The campus has 14 classrooms distributed throughout one level, a large common area, PCs for student use, strong Wi-Fi and a ping-pong table.



The Melbourne campus is located in the heart of the Melbourne Central Business District on level 6 of a beautifully renovated building. Public transport stops directly in front of the building. 

YOUR FIRST DAY AT INTERNATIONAL HOUSE



Classes begin between 8:00 am for our morning timetable and 5:00 pm for our evening timetable for our English Students. However, it is good to note that the timetable can vary, and International House reserves the right to change the timetable at any time without notice.



Please ensure you check with your agency and on your Letter of Offer for the days, times and course in which you are enrolled in, as some courses vary with times and days.

For our ihBC students you will either be taking your classes virtually or face to face at the campus you are enrolled at.



When you arrive for your first day, you must proceed to Student Services to record your arrival. Remember to bring with you your Passport, Letter of Offer, and any other document in which we have asked you to bring along with you.



For our English students, if you haven't already done so, we will ask you to take a quick computer test to assess your English level, so that we can assign you to the right class. Our computer-based Placement Test can be accessed offshore also.

Your Student Services Officer/s will show you around the college and you will also be given your Orientation Pack.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Each Campus participates in Social Activities each week. Student Services organise these for the month and we welcome any ideas you and your peers may have.

When you are out and about throughout the year, it is advised that you carry with you, an umbrella, and a jacket (this is especially helpful for air-conditioned classrooms).

OVERSEAS STUDENT HEALTH COVER

International House offers OSHC to our students who are looking for other options or in need to apply for OSHC for their time here in Australia.

Our provider is Allianz Global Assistance and Medibank Private, and we have various options for you to pick from depending on your Visa type. Please be advised that International House can only assist in booking OSHC for students on a Student Visa. If you are holding any other Visa, we can assist, but are not able to book this with your application.

Each OSHC provider will have an app for you to find relevant information about your OSHC plan. Contact information and additional resources that you may need.

How to find a Doctor when you are unwell



Are you experiencing a medical emergency?

Call 000 immediately or go to your nearest hospital. An emergency is a serious illness or injury that poses an immediate risk to your life or long-term wellbeing.

Your OSHC application will assist in helping you find a doctor that will take the insurance that you are currently holding.

TeleHealth - Doctors on Demand

Most OSHC providers will offer 'Doctors on Demand'. This is your normal consultation over video conferencing, which means you don't have to leave the comfort of your own home. All Doctors who take part in this are qualified Medical Practitioners.

Booking TeleHealth Consultations here or simply download the App from the App Store or GooglePlay.

Claimining receipts through your OSHC



You can either pay the full amount to the medical provider then use the tax invoice to submit a claim, or you can request for your OSHC provider to pay the medical provider directly.

If using the tax invoice to submit a claim, you will be able to take a picture and upload your tax invoice through your OSHC app. Alternatively, you can visit a branch and make a claim over the counter.

Ambulance Cover on your OSHC



Cover for an Ambulance may be an "extra" on your OSHC plan. It is a good idea to check with your provider the details of the cover for using the Ambulance Services here in Australia. Please be aware that you may be charged for any time that you have used this service. A bill will be sent to the address you provide the Paramedics or Hospital Administration.



Student Residence



I am independent and I want to make friends from around the world!

Residential accommodation is best for students that are independent or travelling together with friends and want to live with other international students.

Our student residence partners offer modern, purpose-built student accommodation, within 10-50 minutes from our school campuses, dependant on location. Choose from single or shared rooms or upgrade to a studio apartment!

You can also stay in a modern and purpose-built student residence, where you can choose from single or shared rooms and enjoy living with other international students. Cook dinner with your housemates or watch a movie in the communal living areas. Utilities and Wi-Fi are included, and coin-operated laundry facilities are available onsite.

Homestay Accommodation

I want to improve my English and experience the Australian way of life!

Homestay accommodation is best for students that want to improve their English with native speakers and experience the Australian way of life!

Host families live 30-60 minutes from school by public transport. Meals are included (breakfast and dinner on weekdays and lunch included at weekends). You will have your own private, fully furnished bedroom with a bed, study desk, linen, and clothes storage. Utilities and laundry facilities are included, and Wi-Fi is available at an additional cost.

Undergraduate Students

International House will arrange Homestay accommodation for students under 18 years of age, due to guardianship liabilities. Your host family will look after you during your stay in Australia.

Student Accommodation

We understand that finding affordable and comfortable accommodation can be challenging when you move to a new city or country. We hope that the information we have provided here can make it easier for you to find your home away from home.

The accommodation links below are provided to you for assistance only. International House recommends that you carefully research your accommodation provider before signing an agreement or lease with them. International House will not be held liable for any damage or loss involved, should anything not go to plan.

Airport Transfers

International House can arrange your airport pick-up and airport drop-off service, should you require this on arrival or departure. Our driver will meet you at the airport and drive you to your homestay or student residence accommodation.

Airport pick-up services are mandatory for underage students arriving in Australia by themselves. We also offer unaccompanied minor transfer services for underage students that have booked this arrangement with their airline.

Airport transfer services must be booked at least 2 weeks prior to your arrival in Australia. Contact accommodation to make a booking.

There are many forms of transportation in each state that provide ease of access to get you where you need to go, when you need to go. These modes are Trains, Buses, Ferries, Ride Shares/Taxis and walking.



Train

Usually, the easiest form of travel around a city like Sydney or Melbourne is by train. Transportation varies in each state and it is advised to do your research about how you will get around once you have arrived.

Depending on the location in which you are studying, you may need to purchase a special reusable ticket, that you can regularly top up.

There are specific apps designed to display all train timetable information, and you can search these through the App Store or Google Play on your phone.



Buses

Bus stops are located throughout the city and are usually the most convenient way to travel to beaches, malls, and other points of interest. You will need to signal the driver, as the bus is approaching, if you would like them to stop. Usually when trains have stopped working due to rail work, buses will replace the routes.



Taxis/Ride Share

Taxis and Ride Shares, while more expensive than most public transportation, can be safer if you do not wish to travel alone at night. You can arrange to be picked up from a specific location or by waving for a taxi in the street. The light on top of the Taxi will be orange if unavailable.



Trams or Light Rail

Stops are located at various intervals in each city. Most offer the ability to use your 'top up' cards that you can use for the train or the bus.

Australian Immigration

- 1. When you first arrive in Australia, you will need to proceed through to Australian Immigration. Follow the signs for Arriving Passengers as you disembark from the aircraft.
- 2. An Immigration Officer will ask to see your incoming passenger card, along with your passport and any other documents they may require.
- 3. You will need to fill out all the information on the card, including your new residential address in Australia. It's a good idea to have this noted down in writing in case you cannot access your mobile phone.
- 4. You should be prepared to show the Officer your Enrolment Packet which will include your Letter of Offer and eCOE, and evidence that you have enough money to sustain yourself whilst studying here in Australia.
- 5. You may be asked a few questions about your studies and stay. It is important that you answer these questions truthfully.
- 6. Once you have finished with the Immigration Officer, you can proceed through the terminal to collect your baggage, and head to Australian Customs.

Australian Customs and Quarantine

Restrictions in Australia are very strict; you must not bring prohibited items such as food, plants, or drugs into Australia. If you have any of these items with you, you must declare them on the customs declaration card that was given to you during your flight.

If you are ever in doubt, you should ask the Customs Officer, as there are serious penalties and fines that may be given to people who make false claims.

Customs Officials often use highly trained dogs to check luggage throughout the airport. If this is the case, follow the instructions from the Customs Officers, and do not attempt to touch the dogs.

Arrivals Hall

You will be able to leave the restricted area and enter the Arrivals Hall after you have cleared Customs. You will find several food and retail outlets along with public telephones, money exchange, and a traveller's advisory. If you are arriving on a weekend, please note that some of these stores may be closed.

International Student Welcome Desk

Located at most airports in Australia is the International Student Welcome Desk. This is a one-stop shop of information for students arriving in Australia. You can receive immediate advice and printed guides with maps and information about accommodation and transportation. Local and international student volunteers staff these desks, and they are usually open 7 days a week.

GETTING SET UP IN AUSTRALIA

Money, Banking & Tax File Number

There's so much to see, do, and enjoy as an International Student in Australia from the moment you arrive, so it is a great idea to have your finances organised beforehand to avoid unnecessary stress and for you to make the most out of your time here. From the cost of living in your city, how to open a bank account, and tips on budgeting, these resources will cover everything you need to know about money in Australia.

Australia is home to some of the most affordable student accommodation. To work out how much it is going to cost to live in your city, have a go at using the Cost of Living Calculator.

You may also need assistance with setting up an Australian Bank account. We have provided some information below that may assist you with opening an account here in Australia. When you arrive here in Australia, simply head to the bank of your choice and let them know you are an international student wishing to open a bank account. You will need to bring:

Proof of Identification

Proof of Enrolment Proof of your address in Australia

Please do not use the College as your address as we may not be able to get your mail to you.

The main banks in Australia are Commonwealth Bank (CBA), Australian and New Zealand Bank (ANZ), Westpac, and National Australia Bank (NAB). You do not need a Tax File Number to create a bank account, however, you may be taxed at a higher rate. If you would like to apply for a Tax File Number you can do so through the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Employment

One of the many unique and amazing opportunities to study in Australia comes with the ability to work. Students who hold a student visa are generally only allowed to work 20 hours a week (40 hours a fortnight/biweekly) and while studying it is very common to look for a job and receive employment.

Australia has laws that guarantee basic human rights while in the workplace. You should always be paid for the work you do, including trial shifts, regular shifts, and any overtime that may occur. We know this can be daunting but check out the resources we have provided, and you will be on your way!

Writing a Resume

The basics of a resume include your contact details, previous work history and, for students and recent graduates, details about your education. Keep it as concise as possible and get somebody to proofread it for you. You should include at least one reference on your resume; this can be a previous employer, or someone who knows your work or study ethic. A Resume and Cover Letter should be targeted for a specific job that you are applying for.


